Wellness News Alzheimer's and Brain Awareness Month



Each June, Alzheimer's and Brain Awareness Month is recognized as a time to raise awareness about Alzheimer's disease and other dementias. Let's make sure we know what these words mean.

Dementia: is not a specific disease but rather an overall term that describes a wide range of symptoms associated with a decline in memory or other thinking skills.

*Alzheimer's*: is the most common type of dementia and accounts for 60-80% of cases.

#### Food Safety Tips

Let's bust those home canning myths! Use safe canning sources for the science based answers. Yes, you have "survived" doing a questionable canning procedure this long, but start now to take your home food preservation to the next level of food safety.

#### MYTH #1: "Grandma's canning reci-

**pes are safe.**" I am a grandmother and want all my recipes to be safe. I know my grandmother's recipes used before 1995 were often not safe. While these long used family recipes are nostalgic, use science based SAFE SOURCES which are:

- The National Center for Home Food Preservation
- USDA's Complete Guide to Home Canning
- A Cooperative Extension Service
   publication
- Ball Home Preserving

MYTH #2: "A sealed jar is a safe jar." A sealed jar doesn't guarantee safety. For canned goods to be safe, they must be processed using a science based recipe, using a Ball canning lid, and be properly sealed for no more than 2 years. Ball is formulating a reusable canning lid, so watch for news to come.

MYTH #3: "Tomatoes are high-acid and safe to be water-bath canned." Actually, tomatoes have varying acidity and there is no home acid test for tomatoes. Tomatoes require acidification to safely process in a water bath or pressure canner. To acidify, use bottled lemon juice, citric acid powder or 5% vinegar. A science based recipe will list the correct quantities.

MYTH #4 "Any food may be canned at home." Not true. Commercial equipment reaches higher temperatures than home equipment. Foods which are never safe to can at home are pureed pumpkin or squash, pumpkin pie filling, pumpkin butter, any dairy products, or soups containing noodles or dumplings (this is not the complete list). #### Virginia Creeper

I have had three pastures this spring that have been infested with Virginia Creeper (2024). Each pasture had experienced some possible livestock poisoning or toxicity that may have been related to this perennial vining plant.

This plant is somewhat toxic to humans and livestock and should be completely eradicated from pastures. It usually shows up along fence lines where it likes to trellis upward. It is classified as a stomach irritant.

The plant can be identified as a woody vine, with elliptical leaves of five individual leaflets. The leaflets have saw-toothed edges, and the leaves are green in summer and a bit orange in Fall. It has clusters of black or blueish berries on red stems. Small, greenish-white to yellowish-green flowers are prevalent.




#### Pear Rust (Trellis Rust)

This has been a cool wet spring (2024). Cool wet weath- face. They are up to 6 mm high and rupture along lateral er creates an ideal condition for fungal diseases to thrive, grow, and spread. In our Master Gardener program, we teach the concept of the plant disease triangle. The three sides of the triangle represent a susceptible host, a virulent pathogen, and a conducive environment. Each side of the disease triangle needs to be present for a plant disease disease handbook 2024). to take hold and flourish. Pears are susceptible to virulent forms of fungi called rusts.

This year I have seen a few instances of rust in pears. From the Pacific Northwest disease handbook, the following is important:

"Symptoms Yellow to bright orange leaf spots appear on leaves, fruit, twigs, and branches of pear. Occasionally, infected fruit mummifies and falls to the ground. Leaf lesions can grow together and cover much of the leaf surface when the disease is severe. These symptoms occur in spring and can be confused with other rust species. Unlike other rusts, acorn-shape aecia form on the lower leaf surslits. Aecia can develop by mid-June and into the fall and again another growing season if on perennial parts of tree. Cultural control methods include: eliminating either host is the only practical cultural control. If pear is the important plant, remove all juniper from a 1,000-ft radius." (PNW







This perennial weed has been prevalent this spring (2024). Most calls have asked what herbicide to use for and a long, beak-like fruit. good control. The control of this weed depends on application timing of herbicides and not necessarily what chemical to use. Early spring

herbicides, and an application just after the first fall frost, will do a better job at killing the root than summer applications. This weed is also called cranesbill, herons bill and storks bill. Utah State Extension has some great information on this weed below.

"Filigree is a low-growing, densely matted plant with fernlike leaves that grow in a rosette form leaves have reddish

stems and are covered in fine hairs, flower stalks support two to twelve vibrant pink/purple flowers with five petals

**IPM Recommendations** 

Hand-pull plants in planting beds prior to seed maturation. Shallow tillage or hoeing will control young plants in planting beds. Apply a mulch layer 3 inches deep on planting beds to reduce seed germination. Competition for light from taller desired vegetation can help control weedy patches. Apply an appropriate pre-emergent herbicide prior to seed germination or apply an appropriate post-emergent herbicide directly to target weeds." 
