Growing Seedling vegetables for transplanting

It is getting close to the time for planting vegetable transplants for the spring garden. And when I say, "close," I mean the timing of initiating seedlings is critical. If you plant too early, seedlings will become long and tall with less vigor and a lowered ability to tolerate transplant shock. If you delay planting, you will lose the benefits of season extension. Some of the vegetables you can successfully start as seedlings and then transplant include: tomato, pepper, cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, cucumbers, pumpkins, and melons.

Starting seeds indoors requires disease free potting soil, preferably pasteurized at a temperature above 160 degrees Fahrenheit for over a half hour. Never use your own natural garden soil as that will exacerbate seedling mortality due to damping off disease. Natural soil is also easily compacted and can lead to germination issues.

Cold tolerant vegetables such as broccoli and cauliflower are planted 6 weeks prior to transplanting. Tomatoes, cucumbers, and melons usually only need 4 to 5 weeks. All vegetable seedlings will need time to harden off the plantlets prior to planting in the garden. This is accomplished by placing the seedlings in progressively hostile environments. I suggest first plac-

ing them just inside the garage with the door only partially open. This will expose the plantlets to some direct sun, wind, and other difficult situations. The plant will respond by developing cell-wall and internal changes that make it more robust and resistant to harsh environments. As the days go on, you will progressively expose the seedlings to longer and more challenging bouts with the outside environment.

The chart to the right is information from the University of Idaho CIS Series #800 (Colt et. Al.) and is for the Boise area. This article is adapted from this publication. In Eastern Idaho we will need to adjust back the dates two or more weeks depending on the year.

Many gardeners in eastern Idaho wait until May to plant anything in their gardens. While mid to late May is the appropriate time to plant warm season, frost tender vegetables such as corn, peppers, tomatoes, cucumbers etc., there are many cold hardy, frost tolerant vegetables that can be planted much earlier. In fact, May is almost too late for planting certain cool season vegetables like Radishes and Lettuce which can turn hot and bitter if they mature and are harvested in the heat of summer. It will be better to plant those in March or early April and harvest them in May and

early June before the hot summer weather hits.

Lettuce, radishes and spinach are frequently planted mid-March in Pocatello and by April 1 in the colder outlying areas. You will need to start them indoors a few weeks prior to that. Mid-May, on a good well environmentally behaved year, is when we can transplant less cold tolerant vegetables such as corn, peppers, tomatoes, and cucumbers.

The Noxious Weeds of Idaho

The last time I wrote about noxious weeds a few years ago there were 57. That number has increased to 73. Each year more plants are added to the list. The State of Idaho Department of Agriculture is responsible for administration of the State Noxious Weed Law. There are three control categories.

The first category is the "early detection and rapid response" (EDRR) list. Weeds



4-H Vaccine Suggestions & Weight Guidelines

Swine

Pigs should have received their vaccines prior to being started in the project by the breeder. It is difficult to get vaccine for pigs in single doses. Some diseases to be concerned about are Mycoplasma, Influenza, erysipelas, circovirus, parvovirus, PRRS, and porcine epidemic diarrhea virus. These diseases cause diarrhea or pneumonia in pigs. Cleanliness is very important in preventing these diseases in pigs.

Any animal off feed, with a snotty nose, droopy ears, or with diarrhea should be examined by a veterinarian. If you don't know what is going on with your animal, ask your leader or a veterinarian. It never hurts to ask.

Make sure to follow withdrawal guidelines on all medications administered to your project animals. This will also include all medicated feeds, which may have longer withdrawal time so pay attention to feed tags.
