- Review your Social Security

- Take 5 minutes to do a wallet inventory. Empty the contents of your wallet. Make a list of the details of each card or item. If your wallet is ever stolen or missing, this inventory will help you place a hold, replace cards, or cancel accounts. Passwordprotect the document or store the list in a locked filing cabinet or safe.

#### **Food Preservation Tips**

New canning guidance for Boiling water canning of applesauce and apple butter has been released by Ball. Fuji apples purchased in stores were lower in pH so Ball has added lemon juice to those recipes. The National Center for Food Preservation and So Easy to Preserve have NOT changed their recipes. So what is a home canner to do??? Each research kitchen has their own food scientists who are united in most aspects of home canning.

As a food safety and food preservation specialist, I suggest to always error on the side of caution. It is very easy to add acid, which is called acidification, by adding bottled lemon or lime juice (1 tablespoon per pint or 2 tablespoons per quart) 5% acidity vinegar (2 tablespoons per pint or 4 tablespoons per quart), or Citric Acid USP (1/4 teaspoon per pint, ½ teaspoon per quart). Please follow science based canning recipes. It is ALWAYS a good idea to be safe instead of sorry and get a foodborne illness. Call me at 208-785-8060 or email your questions to jhbuck@uidaho.edu

#### Pumpkin Leather

2 cups canned or fresh pureed pumpkin ½ cup honey ¼ tsp. cinnamon 1/8 tsp. nutmeg 1/8 tsp. ground cloves

Blend all ingredients together. Spread on dehydration tray lined with plastic wrap. Dry at 140° F. Leather should be dry enough to cut or wrap without cracking. Store in labeled jar or freeze.

#### **Trees Adapted to Our Area**

Landscape trees are a long-term investment. satisfaction. A poorly adapted tree can lower the value of the land, interfere with power lines, and be expensive to maintain. You must first choose a tree that • has the correct mature height and width. It must be lower than overhead obstructions such as power lines, as well as fit between buildings and other vegetation. Plant the trees far enough apart to avoid inter- • ference at maturity.

Landscape trees must also be adapted to our environment and our disease complex. We live in a dessert environment where temperatures fluctuate rapidly and winter time lows can kill or damage many species. We also have high pH soils that contribute to low availability of nutrients for many tree species. There are, however, species that are adapted to this environment that thrive in our area.

Below is a list of a few species of trees to avoid

and the reason they should be avoided. You may see Choosing and planting well adapted trees is critical for these species being planted but remember that as the tree matures it can become increasingly difficult to maintain.

- Autum Blaze Maple Does not do well in alkaline soil.
- Paul's Scarlet Hawthorn Mature tree susceptibility to fire blight.
- Amur Maple Die back due to iron chlorosis.
- Ash Susceptibility to borer insects if stressed.
- Black Locust Susceptibility to borer insects if stressed.
- Eastern White Pine Has trouble surviving into maturity.
- Flowering Pears Iron chlorosis if overwatered.
- Idaho White Pine Does not do well in alkaline soil.
- Japanese Flowering Cherry Not winter hardy.

#### **Fall Storage and Preservation of Vegetables**

Today I just answered my third phone call on how to store carrots for the winter. Two of the callers had already washed the carrots and put them into buckets. That may not be the right thing to do. I do not usually recommend washing vegetables that you are going to store. Wash them when you are going to eat them.

In my opinion, carrots should be left in the ground and covered with straw for the winter. They keep very well there even in icy and cold conditions. The down side is that you have to go out in the snow or mud and dig them out. However, they are the best tasting when stored in this manner. Another method is to dig the carrots, rub off large dirt clods, remove the tops, and store them at 32 to 40 degrees F, with 90 to 95% humidity (cold moist storage). They will keep 4 to 6 months in this way.

Storing potatoes also has a trick to it. You must dig the spuds 2 weeks after the tops have died back. This helps the skin to cure or harden off. Once again, remove the dirt and or mud, but do not wash them. Potatoes also do best in cool moist storage areas

(remember walking into a potato cellar). Keep potatoes at 45 to 50 degrees F, with 80 to 90% humidity.

In order to maintain this environment you may have to store them in a refrigerator set at this temperature. Some feel that they need to be in plastic bags in order to maintain the humidity, but if you are not careful they could rot that way.

Each vegetable needs a different kind of storage. Besides the above types, there are: cool and dry storage (garlic), as well as warm and dry (winter squash) storage methods.

All returning certified 4-H Volunteer leaders from last year will need to re-certify for the 2024-25 4-H year. Volunteer Leaders cannot begin club meetings, activities until certification is met. As a reminder, the certification process includes:

- Re-enrollment into your family profile on 4h.zsuite.org (use the same login and password you use for record book purposes). Sign all waivers and update all personal and club information as needed. If you are combining with another club or changing your club name, please let us know, ASAP!
- Complete the "Protecting Minor's Training" (required every 3 years) located in the Clover Academy on the left side of the screen. Choose the "Protecting Minor's Training". This alerts staff of your completion.
- Update the background screening every three years. Volunteers that need to update their screening will be notified and sent the link to do so.

- Insurance fee for volunteers will be paid by Bingham County 4-H.
- Once the above steps are completed and verified, volunteer leaders will receive a certification letter via email.
