Our habits are familiar behaviors. Have you considered the cost of your habits? Most households spend over \$150 on spontaneous purchases each month. A daily soda, coffee, snack, etc. quickly adds up. Take one habit and evaluate how you could cut the cost this month. Reducing spending temporarily allows you to rethink the value of the item.

<u>Be Safe</u>

Are you prepared? Preparing for the unexpected is an abstract concept to many people. How do we prepare for something we don't know is coming? Before life sends us an emergency, when our body goes into the natural fight, flight, or freeze response, consider ways to get ready. Disaster preparedness takes active steps which can occur each week. Start with your emotional readiness:

 Emotional preparedness. Take a deep breathe, in through your nose for a count of four. Hold it for four. Breathe out through your nose for four. Hold for four. Repeat. This is box breathing and can bring you back to a sense of connection with yourself. Food Preservation Tips

One of the most common calls into my office is asking if a pressure cooker can be used as a pressure canner, especially an Electric pressure cooker. The short answer is NO. A pressure cooker is not designed to preserve food. Why? Because there is no pressure gauge on the cooker. Low acid foods, which need to be pressure canned, need TIME and PRESSURE to be made safe in an approved pressure canner, which has either a weighted gauge or a dial gauge. The pressure, heat, and time is tested by food scientists to determine the safe time and amount of pressure according to altitude. In Bingham County, the dial pressure gauge should be at 13 pounds or on a weighted gauge at 15 pounds. Even though some appliances for sale indicate they are safe to preserve food as well as cook food, there is NO independently validated recipes.

Curlycup Gumweed control in non-cropland areas

Curlycup Gumweed is a native plant. It, however, is undesirable as forage and is not utilized by livestock. Gumweed is also not suited to holding soil and can contribute to erosion and other problems. It is competitive, and takes over pastures. It is highly drought tolerant, and increases during dry years, like this year. For this reason Gumweed is everywhere. It is doing well this year.

Gumweed is a biennial (lives for two years), with bright yellow flowers. It started flowering the last week in July this year. The flowers and the leaves have glands that exude a sticky sap. It is a really sticky plant. Hand pulling the plant leaves your fingers sticking together (use gloves). It also gives off a bad smell.

The most effective and easiest way to control Curlycup Gumweed is to mow it. It cannot take mowing at all. It would be best to mow it prior to flowering. There are also chemicals that control it. In non-crop areas (areas where you don't have plants you are trying to preserve) you can use 2,4-D. Make sure and use a form that is labeled for home use. I had a homeowner use a volatile ester form of

2,4-D, and it caused permanent damage to his garden. Dicamba, and metsulfuron are also labeled to control Gumweed in non-crop areas.




Selection of landscape trees for Southeastern Idaho

Planting a tree that at maturity will be too tall or large for the yard, or is not adapted to our environment, or is susceptible to prevalent diseases leads to long term frustration and expense. Trees, of course, take many years to grow to maturity. You have a lot invested in the trees you plant. You don't need to find out 10 years on that you have a problem tree.

The Pocatello Tree Commission years ago put in a lot of effort to develop a list of trees that are well adapted to our area. Some of the trees that are well adapted to our area include: Goldenrain Tree, Washington Hawthorn, Chokecherry, Sumac, Redbud, Honeylocust, Little leaf Linden, Northern Catalpa, and others.

The tree guide also lists trees that are not well adapted to our area and the reasons they are problematic. A few trees to avoid planting include: Autumn Blaze Maple, Paul's Scarlet Hawthorn, Ash, Black Locust, Eastern White Pine, Flowering Dogwoods, Flowering Pears, Magnolia, Paper Birch, Pin Oak, Quaking Aspens, Sycamore, Tulip tree, and others. You will find some of these non-recommended trees growing in our area, but remember that, while they may grow and persist for a short time, eventually you risk having a location, disease, or weak wood problem in the future.

Remember to plant the correct tree, with the correct height, and winter hardiness to avoid future problems.
